

Reading with Toddler

Toddlers need to have many books read to them before they start to read themselves. When they have many, many opportunities with reading, including have books read to them and sharing favourite stories, they learn how books work and that reading is fun. They begin to handle books with care and purpose and understand that the print and pictures carry messages.



Choosing books for toddlers

- Board books are highly practical choices as they are sturdy and can be frequently handled and carried
- Simple story books with paper pages, lots of pictures and smaller amounts of text, encouraging talking and discussion about the pictures as you read together
- Predictable books about songs or with rhyme and repetition are engaging choices

Rhythm, rhyme and repetition in nursery rhymes, songs and quality picture books encourage early reading. The patterns here emphasise words so that they can be clearly heard, understood and predicted. Books about songs are wonderful because toddlers can make connections with the words they know and the pictures they can see. Songs with actions bring the words to life.

Toddlers are constantly on the **move** and might not sit in one place for very long. However, toddlers still need reading **experiences** every day. Toddlers enjoy books with lots of **action** about everyday experiences that help them **explore** and **understand** their world.

These well known, quality picture books feature rhythm, rhyme and repetition and when read aloud, support your toddler's developing language and literacy. Toddlers need to hear many, many books read aloud before they begin to read themselves and quality book choices support this process. These books should be read and read and read until they are familiar friends. Emphasise the word patterns and rhymes. Toddlers love the way the words sound and to join in.

Tips for Reading with Toddler

- **Make friends with stories.** Read the same books over and over again. Recite rhymes and sing the same songs... again and again.
- **Point to words while reading.** Demonstrate the process-moving hand from left to right. Encourage toddler to turn the pages and point to what they see (e.g. Can you find the bear?)
- **Make the story exciting.** Help the story come alive. Use expression, voices and make the animal noises. Have fun and play. It is not necessary to read the whole book.
- **Make it personal.** Chat about toddler's family, pets or friends throughout, making personal connections wherever possible.
- **Point and name to build vocabulary.** Ask questions about the pictures and encourage lots of talking.
- **Encourage movement.** Toddlers are movers and may move, wiggle and dance during reading. Carry on- chances are the toddler is listening while moving. Incorporate movement into the story for even greater connection.
- **Find words that rhyme in stories and songs.** Play with words and make up silly words.
- **Notice letters and words in everyday life** e.g. on signs, in books, packaging

The magic of bringing print to life happens through the interactions which engage the toddler, encouraging joining in, actions and prediction. This is where a life long love of reading begins.
